







One local showed me a hiking tour to Itoshima's Mt. Takeshita, where I took this incredible picture and enjoyed more breathtaking views.

One of my favourite restaurants was a chain restaurant called "Yayoi Ken", which also served vegetarian options! It was also very cheap and incredibly delicious.




The main dish was actually a soy-based meat substitue and tasted incredible! Japan, especially Fukuoka, has really tasty food.




Beautiful Christmas Illumination at Hakata Station.




